I am not sure why, but I am still surprised that after preparing and teaching an informative and dynamic lesson, what seems to really get my students motivated and working hard are my words of encouragement at the end of the lesson. Within just a few minutes of getting started, I usually have several excited hands in the air waiting to show me their progress.

WHAKATANE ROTARY SPONSORSHIP



Then, onto the North Island Club Champs, Ben Olifiers won the B finals in the Men's Intermediate Single Sculls. He paired up with Isaac Jensen (from WHS) to win the Men's Intermediate Double Sculls. Holly Hay placed 7th in the Women's Club A Final. Miria Bluett and Ayla Rowe raced in the Women's Novice Double Sculls and placed 6th in their Repechage missing out on the Semi Final. Miria was in the Women's Novice Coxed Quad Sculls and Ayla also competed in the Women's Intermediate Coxed Octuple Sculls. Renske placed 3rd in the Women's Club Quad (Composite Crew with Bay Coast).

bring a note excusing themselves from participating but must still get changed into PE uniform.


Anyone who may have forgotten their gear must line up in the 'no gear' line at the start of the lesson to borrow school gear.
