Our year 9 and 10 students have just finished their examinations and will be preparing for the Camp week and then the long holidays. As we reflect on the year, we can look at how we would like our students to develop over the next 3 to 4 years as powerful learners.

Building Powerful Learners

If parents were to enquire whether their child had become more perseverant, or imaginative, or independent over their time in the school, what would the answer be? Hopefully, "yes", or some bland statement about "sticking at things for longer"? How would they cope in the changing world of the 2020s?

'Students throughout the world need now to reach higher levels of achievement, not only to find fulfilling work but also to empower themselves to thrive in an increasingly complex world' - Dylan Wiliam

Of course the job of any school is to prepare youngsters for their future lives. Students need the exam results AND a set of generic skills and attitudes to deal with complexity; learning dispositions such as curiosity, inquisitiveness, experimentation, reflectiveness

For years now research in the learning sciences has shown that learning is itself a learnable craft; that we can all get better at learning. This means that schools, teachers and indeed parents can enable young people to develop as better, more effective learners.

Building students learning power is about:

- Helping young people to help themselves become better learners
- Developing students' learning habits
- Preparing young people for a lifetime of learning Building students as powerful learners:
 - Is based on a coherent picture of what it takes to be a good learner
 - capitalises on previous learning-to-learn
 - grows a student's learning character and
 - develops the appetite and ability to learn in different ways
 - transforms the culture of the classroom and the climate of the school
 - shifts responsibility for learning to learn from the teacher to the learner
- engages teachers and students creatively as researchers in learning
- gives schools the opportunity to track students' learning development

What effect will developing students learning behaviours have?

- raised achievement
- improved behaviour
- increased motivation
- supple learning minds
- established habits of lifelong learning
- enhanced creativity

First Year Fees Free

- 1. Check fees-free eligibility (instructions below)
- 2. Apply for StudyLink assistance early by 16th December 2019 and track progress on line
- 3. Make a financial plan Know the cost create a budget
- 4. Have a conversation about money Who is going to pay for what? Talk about financial responsibility.

To check Fees Free eligibility:

- 1. Find out student's NSN number
- 2. Check eligibility online at www.feesfree.govt.nz
- If your eligibility result is unknown, complete a statutory declaration and email it to feesfreecheck@tec.govt.nz
- 1. If not eligible, organise alternative payment.


